New \$1 million initiative combats hunger in rural Iowa and Wisconsin

A new initiative will provide \$1 million over the next two years to combat hunger across lowa and Wisconsin. In partnership with local food banks, the Alliant Energy Foundation recently announced the Rural Hunger Initiative, a collaborative effort to combat the challenges surrounding food insecurity in rural communities.

In Iowa, Food Bank of Iowa and HACAP Food Reservoir saw a need for food pantries in schools. The Rural Hunger Initiative supports their work as they create safe and convenient community spaces. In some locations, this support will offer a boost to existing pantries. In



others, it will help expand into communities currently without access to food pantries.

Some of our food bank partners in lowa are developing a system to deliver fresh protein from agricultural partners directly to neighbors. In Wisconsin, our partners are exploring a unique and innovative card option for local shopping. We'll announce more about these and other programs within the initiative soon.

Foundation updates

Iowa and Wisconsin rate reviews

The rate review process is our opportunity to get in front of regulators, lay out our plans and secure the resources necessary to enable our continued success.

As we look for new ways to deliver value to the customers and communities we serve, our values and long-range strategic planning play a major role. In both Iowa and Wisconsin, we're moving forward with our Clean Energy Blueprint – our roadmap to accelerate renewable energy and achieve the goals laid out in our Clean Energy Vision.

Cleaner energy sources like wind, solar and battery storage have become increasingly cost-effective compared to other technologies. We know these investments create reliable and sustainable benefits for customers as we are able to mitigate the risk of fuel cost volatility and decrease our operation and maintenance expenses. Investing in cleaner energy also stimulates local economies – creating new jobs, attracting businesses and providing recession-proof income to communities. Of course, there are also the environmental benefits of operating renewable resources communities will enjoy for decades to come.

We want to build on our success and deliver long-term value and reliability for our customers. In both lowa and Wisconsin, these rate review processes have been centered around our thoughtful, forward-looking approach to stay ahead of the curve.

As a regulated energy provider, we depend on our regulators' understanding and support of our business. They approve of our business plan and financial goals through the rate-making process. These relationships are central to our regulatory alignment – one of three supporting elements of our strategy.

Everyone at Alliant Energy plays an important role in how we communicate our vision, goals and values. We're appreciative of everyone who has taken the time to learn more and be ambassadors in the communities in which you live and work.



Wisconsin solar program

Our final utility-scale solar project in Wisconsin is near completion. Once operational, the 200-megawatt (MW) Grant County Solar Project in Potosi, Wisconsin will further solidify our position as the largest owner-operator of solar generation in Wisconsin. In total, our Wisconsin solar portfolio includes 12 utility-scale projects with a combined capacity of 1,089 MW.

This investment in a more diverse energy mix improves reliability while sustaining the economic and environmental health of the communities we serve. In addition to generating clean, costeffective energy, our Wisconsin solar projects created more than 2,700 construction jobs across all 12 projects.

We continue to build on this success and recently started construction on two battery energy storage projects co-located at our solar sites. The 75-MW Wood County Battery Project and 100-MW Grant County Battery Project will complement our renewable portfolio and help meet customer needs.

Foundation report 2023: Nearly \$11 million and more than 72,000 volunteer hours given



In its look back at 2023, our Foundation reports that together, we gave nearly \$11 million, and our employees and retirees contributed more than 72,000 hours of volunteer work.

The \$11 million in giving includes employee and retiree giving, donations and grants to qualifying nonprofits in the communities we serve, contributions to the Hometown Care energy fund, in-kind work value, scholarships, contributions to economic development and much more!

Here are highlights of our Foundation's achievements in 2023 in the four strategic focus areas:

- Community safety and engagement: In 2023, we gave donations to improve emergency services, community events, parks and playgrounds. More than \$45,000 in safety grants helped first responders in 44 counties upgrade or purchase new equipment.
- Environmental stewardship: In 2021, we announced our initiative to plant a million trees by the end of 2030. By the end of 2023, we planted more than 463,000!
- Workforce readiness: Our Foundation builds stronger communities by investing in the development of a solid workforce. In 2023, we awarded scholarships to more than 100 students pursuing college and trade school.
- Hunger and housing:
 - Our annual Drive Out Hunger event in 2023 raised \$515,000, the largest amount in 17 years. The event supports seven major food banks in communities we serve in Iowa and Wisconsin.

Alliant Energy and the quest to inspire the workforce of the future



Workforce readiness is one of our Foundation's four focus areas. We support efforts to help students of every age gain the skills to pursue their goals, and to encourage more interest in science, technology, engineering and math.

To bring STEM to life for middle schoolers, we created a graphic novel series called the Power Chronicles. Kids (and adults) can join Akilah on magical journeys through time and space. In her first two adventures, she met women scientists of color from yesterday and today, and learned all about trees and ecosystems. lowa utility-scale solar update

In Iowa, we expect 400 MW of new solar generation will be operational by the end of 2024. Construction is underway at projects in Linn County (200 MW), Lee County (150 MW) and Union County (50 MW).

We anticipate the projects will create approximately 500 local construction jobs and new tax revenue for communities. Once complete, the projects will positively impact the environment and generate enough energy to power over 80,000 homes.

The new solar generation complements the more than 1,300 MW of wind generation we already placed in service in Iowa and further diversifies our energy mix to increase reliability.

Our fully subscribed Fond du Lac Community Solar Project paved the way for our second project within the program.

Our 4.5-megawatt (MW) Cedar Rapids community solar garden began generating clean energy in February and provided bill credits for subscribers in March!

This project is a major milestone showcasing the benefits of low-cost clean energy and will operate for the next 20 years. Based on subscriber interest, we've established a waitlist for customers who want to be notified if solar blocks become available or when we announce a new project in the state.

On the Wisconsin front, we're breaking ground on our Janesville community solar garden this spring and hope to have the project up and running by the end of the year. That project follows the successful completion of our Fond du Lac garden that began generating energy in early 2022.

The Community Solar program allows customers to purchase solar blocks for an upfront fee and receive production bill credits for the 20-year life of the project. The subscription fee covers the costs associated with construction, maintenance and operations of the solar garden and is generally lower than installing rooftop solar or a small array elsewhere.
